



JCI Barbados shortlisted for 2016 Global Youth Empowerment Fund Award

JCI Barbados Green Roots Project is one of the top 10 grantees competing for the 2016 Global Youth Empowerment Fund. The Global Youth Empowerment Fund is an initiative to help young people around the world to create impact in their communities and the Green Roots project is the only project from Barbados and the Caribbean to be shortlisted for this award.

The Green Roots Project is an initiative seeking to educate the youth of Barbados about the environment and to build awareness surrounding the need of making Barbados a “green society”. Charlene Corbin, 2016 President of JCI Barbados explained that “the Green Roots project, now in its fifth year, has expanded to include a component called Feed the Nation. Feed the Nation focusses on a self-sustaining garden system that will be implemented into schools, and students will have the opportunity to learn about bookkeeping and various marketing strategies through hands-on experience.”

Green Roots contributes to the UN Sustainable Development Goal 2, No Hunger. Jovica Headley, 2016 Project Chairperson added that “through this project, Global Goal #2, to end hunger, achieve food security and improve nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture will be advanced”. Participants will also gain an alternative career path in “green collar” jobs.
