Historical Timeline

Headquarters.

1910	-	Henry Giessenbier formed the Herculaneum Dance Club to create closer and more pleasant relationships among members and concentrate their efforts on higher and better ideals and social standing. Henry Giessenbier organized and ran the Federation of Dancing Clubs.
1915-32	-	Young men, led by Henry Giessenbier and Andrew Mungenast, formed the Young Men's Progressive Civic Association (YMPCA).
1915	-	YMPCA became the Junior Citizens ('JCs'). The first JCI Local Organization was founded on October 13th in St. Louis, Missouri, USA.
1920	-	The United States (U.S.) Junior Chamber of Commerce was born. The first National Convention was held in June.
1926	-	The US. Junior Chamber of Commerce became the first national organization to conduct a systemic campaign to educate citizens of their civic duty to vote through the initiation of the 'Get Out the Vote' campaign.
1944	-	The Inter-America Congress was held in Mexico City, Mexico, the forerunner to JCI.
1946	-	The first JCI Convention was held in Panama City, Panama where a provisional Constitution was adopted. C. William Brownfield wrote the JC Creed this year, which was later adopted by JCI in 1948.
1950	-	JCI members partnered with Pan American Airlines during the 14 th JCI World Congress to connect young active citizens with JCI members from around the world.
1952	-	Phil Pugsley received approval for the JCI Senate and Joaquin Gonzalez, former JCI Secretary General from the Philippines, was posthumously honored as JCI Senator No. 1.
1953	-	The first JCI Secretariat was established at the United States Junior Chamber

-	The JCI World Headquarters opened in Miami, Florida (USA).
-	JCI and the United Nations began a relationship with the appointment of JCI's first representative to the UN.
-	'Project Concern' was started to administer dental and primary care to underprivileged individuals in Hong Kong, Vietnam, Mexico and the Appalachiar Mountains in the United States.
-	The JCI Outstanding Young Persons of the World (TOYP) presentation took place for the first time.
-	JCI is present in 55 countries and has 500,000 members
-	The first 'Earth Run' at the 1986 JCI World Congress promoted UNICEF and 'Global Peace for Children'
-	JCI Presidents signed 'The Independent' describing the fall of the Berlin Wall and presented it to JCI Germany.
-	JCI celebrated its 50th anniversary.
-	The JCI World Headquarters relocated to St. Louis, Missouri, USA. The JCI Senate also celebrated its 50th anniversary
-	JCI adopted a new Corporate Identity Program.
-	JCI opened its new World Headquarters in Chesterfield, St Louis Missouri, USA JCI celebrated its 60th anniversary. JCI members join leaders around the world at the JCI-UN Leadership Summit to advance Millennium Development Goals.
-	A Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) representing JCI members from around the world met and made recommendations for the improvement and growth of JCI, creating a 5-year plan for the development of the organization. JCI formalized a partnership with the UN Foundation's 'Nothing But Nets' campaign to raise global awareness, advocate for government funding and fundraise to support the fight against malaria through prevention.

'Operation Brotherhood', JCI's first international campaign, was launched. This

- The UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) Committee on NGOs raised
 JCI's status from "Special" to "General", advancing the long-time partnership
 and collaborative relations between JCI and the UN
- JCI raised US one million dollars for the UN Foundation's Nothing But Nets, a
 global campaign to eradicate malaria and continues their fight against this
 disease.
- JCI adopted the 2014-2018 JCI Strategic Plan and started taking action toward our long-term goal of being the organization that unites all sectors of society to achieve sustainable impact.
- JCI celebrated its 100th anniversary.
 At the 2015 JCI World Congress held in Kanazawa, Japan, JCI leaders commit to advancing the 'Global Goals for Sustainable Development' over the next 15

years
